AMERICAN MEDICINE AT A TURNING POINT

Predictions of the decline in status and authority of physicians in the United States are premature. While professional autonomy and financial independence have waned, physician organizations have emerged as the driving engine of a restructured system of health care finance and delivery.

Having said this, there appears to be little consensus regarding the way that physicians should be organized, teamed and compensated to maximize efficiency, quality, accessibility and professional satisfaction. Many of the most basic questions about the appropriate organization of medical practice are hotly debated.

- How should primary care relate to speciality practice?
- Is virtual or vertical integration the model of the future?
- · Whither the hospital-physician relationship?
- What are the most efficient means of capitalizing medical practice?
- How should physicians be compensated?
- Will physician unions play a significant role in the future of American medicine?

THE NATIONAL CONGRESS ON THE FUTURE OF MEDICAL PRACTICE AND PRACTICE MANAGEMENT

THE NATIONAL CONGRESS ON THE FUTURE OF MEDICAL PRACTICE AND PRACTICE MANAGEMENT has been convened to address these and other issues pertinent to medical practice in the 21st Century. The Congress brings leading medical group and IPA administrators, medical directors and physicians together with academics, health service researchers, vendors, consultants and legal counsel to address cutting-edge issues in physician organization and practice management.

VERTICAL VS. VIRTUAL INTEGRATION

The fundamental structure of physician organizations is at issue. The greatest growth in physician organizations is in the network or IPA model. Integrated group practices continue to grow at a slower pace. Hybrid IPA/Group models are emerging.

SINGLE VS. MULTISPECIALITY GROUPS

Likewise, there is uncertainty regarding whether physicians should be organized into single or multispeciality enterprises.

Organizational formats tend to vary by geographic areas. Western and Midwestern markets coalesce in the multispeciality format. In other areas, single speciality groups are seemingly ascendent.

PUBLICLY-HELD VS. TAX-EXEMPT GROUPS

Traditionally, many of the preeminent multispeciality groups have been structured as tax-exempt enterprises, funded by contributions and tax-exempt debt. With the emergence and proliferation of the publicly-held physician practice management companies (PPMCs) in the early 1990s, a major alternative in legal form and approach to capital access has emerged. With the recent turmoil in PPMC markets, the future of that industry sector hangs fire. For many observers, the choice between remaining privately held or converting to the exempt clinic or publicly-held PPMC models has strong clinical and cultural implications.

HOSPITAL-BASED MEDICAL GROUPS

Making hospital-based IPAs and medical groups work has emerged as one of the most vexing challenges in health delivery. In a paroxysm of vertical integration in the early and mid 1990s, many hospitals acquired physician practices and established affiliated groups or cadres of employed physicians. Recent studies indicate that over 85% of these organizations are losing money. Restructuring existing hospital-physician relations and envisioning new models for the physician-hospital enterprise will be a central focus of the Congress.

THE PHYSICIAN-OWNED HEALTH PLAN NEXUS

The future of physician-owned health plan relations is up for grabs. Most staff model HMOs have spun off their staff divisions into independent group practices — some of which have become or been acquired by PPMCs. A number of physician-owned health plans have been acquired by publicly-owned HMOs. Concurrently, the new Medicare+Choice legislation creates the opportunity for the creation of physician-owned provider-sponsored organizations (PSOs) which can contract directly with the Medicare program.

PHYSICIAN UNIONS

As more physicians have moved into employed positions with group practices, hospitals and health plans, the potential for an enhanced role of physician unions has arisen. Traditional constraints on the unionization of professionals under the National Labor Relations Act and the antitrust laws are being litigated. Prominent unionization campaigns are occurring across the country. To place these developments in context, the Congress will host a plenary panel of the leaders of the country's most significant physician unions.

PRACTICAL SOLUTIONS TO SPECIFIC PROBLEMS

In general sessions, the Congress will address the major strategic and policy issues confronting physician organizations. Through 40 concurrent sessions, the Congress will focus on specific and practical issues challenging physician organizations.

Examples include:

- Implementation of a paperless medical record by the Mayo Clinic.
- Understanding SEC rules regarding pooling vs. purchase accounting, stock options, etc.
- Managing pharmacy risk.
- Understanding the implications of NCQA, JCAHO and AMAP accreditation to physician organizations.

Presenters in the concurrent sessions include senior leadership of America's medical groups and IPAs.

THE CONGRESS STRUCTURE

The central core of the Congress is presented through general and concurrent sessions on Thursday, October 22 and Friday, October 23, 1998.

On Saturday, October 24, 1998, over 25 of the nation's preeminent medical groups, IPAs, PPMCs and hospital and health planaffiliated physician organizations will present in case study format. Each organization will share its history, current structure, business plan and major challenges.
