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

#### **Continuing Education Credit**

ABA - MCLE Credit. Required sponsor documentation has been forwarded to and credit requested from most MCLE states with general requirements for all lawyers. We have requested a total of 17 CLE hours from most MCLE states. Lawyers seeking credit in Pennsylvania must pay fees of \$1.50 per credit hour directly to the PA CLE Board. Medical Education Collaborative pays applicable fees in other states where the sponsor is required to do so and in states where a late fee may become applicable. Please be aware that each state has its own rules regulations, including its definition of CLE; therefore, certain programs may not receive credit in some states. 

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
